## Activities to do at home to reinforce this week's learning goals:

- Have a family meeting, work together to establish a set of family rules, and post them for everyone to see. Discuss what happens when rules are broken.
- Give your child small "jobs" at home. Examples: taking out the trash, setting the table, feeding the family pet, etc. Praise them for completing their responsibilities.
- Let your child help you by setting the table for dinner. Have your child say each item out loud: fork, spoon, plate, bowl, napkin, etc.
- Make a checklist of things your child can do to get ready in the morning on their own. Include pictures so they can easily read it.
- Talk to your child about rules we follow in society (i.e., rules of the road, at parks and playgrounds, etc.) and why it is important to follow them.
- Go to the library and get your child a library card. Tell them it is their responsibility to keep the card safe, check out books, and remember when the books are due.
- Browse the CA Common Core State Standards and begin to familiarize yourself with what will be
  expected of your child in kindergarten.
